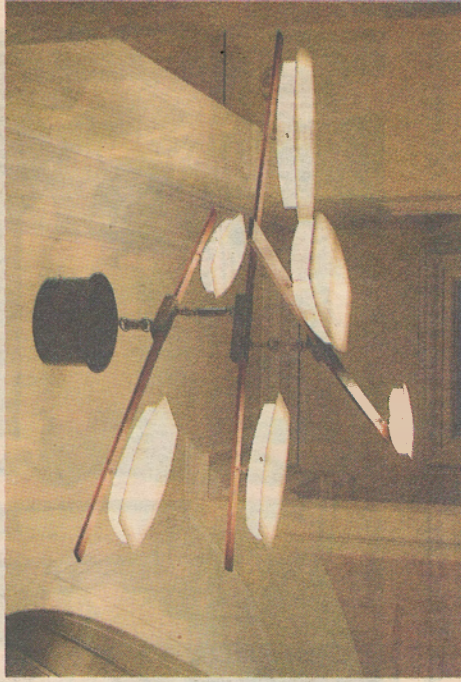
## ILLUMINATION

### Part Chandelier, Part Fan And Fully Variable Lighting

What do you get when you cross a Frank Lloyd Wright lamp with an Alexander Calder mobile? A chandelier-cum-ceiling fan, far right, handmade by Stephane Pagani of Corule Lighting Design in Brooklyn. Found at the French Designer Showhouse (47 East 68th Street), the chandelier has three seven-foot arms of ipe wood (a Brazilian teak, pronounced E-pay) that turn at half a revolution per minute. The lights are shaded with sandblasted Murano glass, and because of the asymmetrical spacing, the light changes as the arms move. Mr. Pagani and his wife, Frouwjke, worked on the show



house together. He likes making mobile lights. "The motion energizes the space, makes the house alive," he said. The chandelier is \$11,200; Mr. Pagani is represented by Clodagh, 670 Broadway (Bond Street). **DAVID COLMAN**
